Flooding is creating havoc on farms and on roads, even in Nairobi. Plus, the excessive rains have resulted in a bumper "harvest" of Paederus beetles ("Nairobi flies"). These little pests

usually show up this time of year and thrive on rotting vegetation, of which there is currently quite an abundance. The guesthouse, dorms, and faculty homes are being invaded by large numbers of them; and they have one nasty trait: the body juices contain a highly irritating substance that can raise painful blisters on contact with skin. Swatting them is not a good idea; nor is brushing them off your face at night. We will not be sorry to leave them behind when we return to the U.S. later this week.



Yes, we moved up our scheduled return to the U.S. by three weeks so we could attend the graduation ceremony of Josiah and Grace on May 4. We will fly out of Nairobi this Wednesday night and arrive in Indianapolis on Thursday around 5:20 PM. We expect to be working remotely from Indianapolis until we return to Kijabe at the end of the year. We were blessed to be able to take a break from sorting through *waaay* too many accumulated trunks, storage tubs and boxes to attend SIM Kenya's annual Spiritual Life Conference April 11-14 at the Lukenya Getaway, about an hour's drive east of Nairobi. What a spiritually refreshing time that was! Our devotional speaker was a retired AIM medical missionary who took us through a series of participatory and contemplative messages on the life and ministry of Jesus. These messages were preceded by deeply meaningful times of worship that drew us into the presence of Christ and nourished our souls.

We also heard encouraging reports, put together by our "SIM Stories" media team, from each of SIM Kenya's ministry focus areas. (Bob appeared twice: once with the Banda Health team as part of SIM Kenya's health ministries; and once with the Moffat Bible College team as part of the Theological Education ministry.) Much of our free time was spent reconnecting and conversing with other SIM missionaries we rarely get to see. It was particularly delightful to reconnect with two Moffat alumni who are collaborating with SIM in exciting outreach ministries to unreached people groups on Kenya's coast.

On the last day, SIM Kenya recognized those who had served with SIM for more than 25 years. We were given a certificate of appreciation and a bouquet of 27 roses representing each of our 27 years of service with SIM. But we weren't the longest serving SIM missionaries at SLC. Our dear colleagues Walter and Christel Gschwandtner received a bouquet of 38 roses!

Construction of Moffat's single-dwelling house for visiting faculty (dubbed the "Carter Cottage") is moving along quickly. The walls are up and plastered, the roof is on, and the plumbing and electrical conduits are being installed. The contractor has asked Hope to choose her preferred colors for the flooring and bathroom tiles, and paint for the inside walls. It will have solar hot water. The contractor thinks he should have it finished by July, but our principal wants to wait until we return late December to commission it – so there is really no rush. Living in the guest house has been an interesting and eye-opening experience; but even so we will be glad to have our own space to live in when we return, including a quiet place for doing office work.

In Kenya, Eid al-Fitr (the day ending the Muslim holy month of Ramadan) was a public holiday. One of the guesthouse residents is from the Gambia, and invited us to "break the fast" with him on that day. He is doing sub-specialty training in urology in Tanzania but is currently on a clinical attachment at Kijabe Hospital. We have enjoyed getting to know him and have had some excellent conversations with him. He prepared a very tasty (and spicey!) meat and vegetable stew with a peanut broth base, and Hope contributed a stack of naan bread, a type of Indian flatbread.



• As we prepare to return to the U.S. in just a few days, today (Sunday) was our last worship service with the praise and worship team for this year. It was a special service to focus on active praying using the 'ACTS' model: Adoration, Confession, Thanksgiving, Supplication. There was no sermon, just worship and prayer. Songs of praise and worship were interspersed with the times of prayer, so we had prepared twice the number of songs as usual. Afterwards, we went to the hospital and sang and prayed for the patients. As Hope said later, "What a great way to go out!" We are going to miss being part of this wonderful team so much!
